How to Live

Today's Gospel reading, often referred to as the Beatitudes, is from Matthew (5:1-12) and is well loved and arguably the best known passage in the Bible, probably due to its poetry as much as its message. Luke gives an almost identical account (6:20-26). This is not surprising given that this address from Jesus was very public, before a very large crowd, and both accounts were written at much the same time, around 80 - 90 A.D. I think the level of concurrence between the two, points to the accuracy of the accounts. If you have time, try reading them both, for an interesting comparison. To some extent, this lesson from Jesus would have been quite controversial, seeming to stand entrenched social order on its head:

Welcome news to some, but maybe not so to the rich and powerful. What I think Jesus was doing was giving us a blueprint for life, instructions for building the Kingdom of God on earth and a road map to eternal life with God our Father. The passage known as the Beatitudes is really the attention-grabbing preamble to the rest of the lesson, the Sermon on the Mount. Keep reading Matthew's gospel through to the end of the Sermon (verse 7:29) and you will find the essence of what Jesus came to teach us. He teaches us in detail how to live by the law, how to keep the commandments, how to treat each other, how to do good works, how to spread the Good News, how to love God and importantly, how to pray. It was in this sermon that Jesus gave us the Lord's Prayer, not just the words to use but how to say them. If you have never read the Sermon on the Mount in full, I encourage you to go home and read it. There is no better, clearer instruction for life and it comes directly from God to us. In summary, it tells us how to keep the two great commandments of love – Love God and Love your neighbour as yourself: the consistent message throughout the ministry of Jesus.

So, now you have some homework to do: read Luke 6:20-26 and Mathew right through from 5:1 – 7:29 and hear the word of the Lord. **Gina Clare**




PARISH LENTEN GROUPS


THERE'S NOTHING ORDINARY ABOUT ORDINARY TIME

The name "Ordinary Time" for that part of the church year outside the seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter is rather an unfortunate term. The word "ordinary" normally means something that is unexceptional or uninteresting. There is no such thing as "ordinary time" in Christian worship. The word "ordinary" as used in "Ordinary Time" means that the Sundays after the seasons of Christmas and Easter are counted in order, using ordinal numbers. It is best to think of Ordinary Time as one of the liturgical seasons – the longest season of the church year. Its liturgical colour of green points to our Christian hope and life, entering into the mystery of Christ in all its fullness. Ordinary Time enables us to devote ourselves to exploring the mystery of Christ in all its aspects and to celebrate the
