Emmaus

I was walking to the bus on my way home from work one night when I saw an old friend who I hadn't seen for ages. We used to bump into each other every few years, but neither of us knew the other had moved to Brisbane. Because I wasn't sure it was him, I discretely followed him and his friend while they walked, looked in shop windows and chatted. Eventually, it felt a bit silly to be following these people around, so I worked up the courage to

speak to him and we've stayed in touch ever since.

Have there been times when you've seen someone you know out of context and not recognised them until they'd passed by? Or other times, when your mind was so full of thoughts and emotions that you couldn't see what's clearly in front of you?

In the first reading, Peter urges the crowd to recognise Jesus as the son of God, while also recognising their responsibility for his brutal death. This is post-Pentecostal Paul; no longer nervously hiding in the shadows and denying knowing Christ, but loudly and proudly proclaiming Jesus as fulfilling the words of the prophets because God has raised him back to life.

In contrast, the two disciples in Luke's Gospel don't recognise Jesus, even though he's walking beside them. Imagine how sad, confused and disappointed those closest to Jesus must have felt after his death, especially given the humiliations he suffered and the gruesome way he was killed. They're walking and talking and trying to make some sense of it all and don't recognise him, even when they discuss his own death and the scripture that points to his resurrection.

Jesus is very patient with them and eventually they do recognise him when they see him doing something familiar to them – breaking and sharing bread. We're very fortunate that we also have the opportunity to recognise Jesus in this act at every Mass and in the acts of kindness and love in our everyday lives. We don't have to walk all the way to Emmaus or stalk him around the streets of Brisbane, he is here with us.

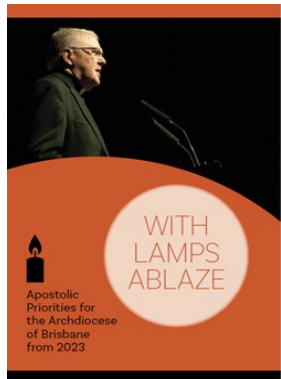
Proper of the Mass

Priority 2- Reshaping Parish Communities

"Our current structures are based upon the facts of an earlier time and our current mode of provision is unsustainable. In the cities at least we have too many parishes and too many

churches. Urban parishes were established on the assumption that people had to be able to walk to church and at a time when the numbers attending Mass were much larger. Many of our parishes are pressed financially and cannot provide the range of services which a missionary Church requires. Therefore, we need – sensibly and over time – to move towards larger configurations of a community of communities where the concentration of personnel and the sharing of resources would allow a greater range of services for the sake of the Gospel. This will be more difficult in rural areas than urban areas, but the same principle of sharing personnel and resources for the sake of mission applies." **Archbishop Mark**

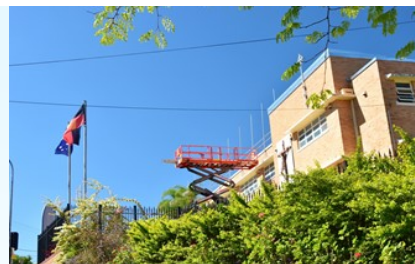

ARCHDIOCESAN CLERGY BEING MADE CULTURALLY AWARE: On Thursday / Friday this week Archdiocesan Clergy are having a workshop led by Bishop Tim Norton. "For all of us, our first or primary culture has had an enormous effect on how we understand ourselves in the world. It is something we rarely question that gives us a sense of belonging. It is the framework within which we situate almost everything we come to know. We teach it to others, just as it was taught to us, often without really knowing why. Our primary culture is the place where we first began to learn about God. This has a deep impact on how we as priests and deacons spread the good news of Jesus. Our time together in the workshop is aimed at helping us understand some of the elements of our primary culture that influence the ways we relate with people and with other clergy, and exercise our ministries in the changing cultural context of the Archdiocese of Brisbane. This work is as valuable for those born in Australia as it is for those born in other parts of the world. Should be interesting.

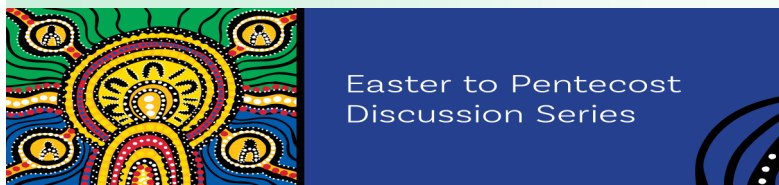
HOW TO VOTE ON THE VOICE TO PARLIAMENT: Fr Frank Brennan SJ has written a short article with suggestions to consider on deciding how to vote on the Voice to Parliament. Hardcopies are available in the churches. You can have it emailed to you by contacting the office. "I suggest ten steps (these the first five) for Catholics inspired by our Catholic social teaching when approaching the forthcoming referendum. I couch these suggestions in terms appropriate for those of us who are not Indigenous. We are all invited into constructive dialogue. We must strive to listen to community leaders who know what is good for their communities just as those of us who are not Indigenous know what is good for ourselves and our loved ones.



1. Be attentive to the voices of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. Stop telling them what is good for them. Start listening to them. Accept that they know what is good for them, just as we know what is good for us and our loved ones.
2. Don't expect all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people to agree about legal, political and constitutional questions. It's called living in a democracy.
3. Form respectful relationships with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and engage in respectful conversations with those who are your friends.
4. Having heard a range of Indigenous voices, make your own decisions about what Aboriginal aspirations are morally justified. What would be right and proper for Australia in the 21st century? For example, the Commonwealth Parliament has power to make special laws about First Nations people. Many Aboriginal people now say, "No special laws without us!"
5. Know your history; know the Aboriginal history. The Australian Constitution does not even mention Aborigines or Torres Strait Islanders. They belong in the Constitution. Their belonging should be explicit and particular."

NOBERT UPDATE: Over the past weeks conversations have been taking place with Senators Chisholm and Watt and Minister Giles. A large number of representations from the Brisbane and Adelaide communities supporting Nibert have been received.
