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Greetings to all,

With advance technology nowadays, we no longer need paper maps to get us from place to place. All that is needed today is to punch in a few words to our smart phones, or GPS and boom, our destination is routed for us. The comforts of navigation allow us to trust the ability that our phones and technology will get us to where we need to be. Yet why is it that we don't always trust God to lead the way?

Today's Gospel passage reminds us that God has a dwelling place for us. Thomas doubts Jesus' path for him when he says, *"Master,*

we do not know where you are going; how can we know the way?" (John 14:5) Thomas doesn't understand because he can't see a physical route, and hasn't been instructed how to get to the destination.

How often, when we don't know what God's plan is or what the future holds, do we question Him? Jesus reminds Thomas that he doesn't need to know a physical route or path, he doesn't even need to know what the plan is, but he does need to trust in God. *"I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the father except through me"* (John 14:6).

Jesus lays out the path for Thomas. He lays out the path for all of us, even if we can't see what that path looks like. Today's Gospel reminds us to put our faith in God and that through our faith we will enter into God's house. When we are going through a hardship, Jesus will lead the way; when we struggle with finances or work relations, Jesus will help us navigate. When illness or tragedy come upon us, Jesus' path will lead to peace and comfort. A question to ponder: How can we allow God to take over the steering wheel of our lives? *Fr Dang*

Why is May the Month of Mary?

Among Catholics, May is 'Mary's month' a specific month of the year dedicated in honour of our Blessed Mother Mary. Why is that?

Many Western cultures view May as a month of life and motherhood. In her way, Mary gave new life to the

world when she gave birth to our saviour Jesus Christ.

The practice of honouring Mary during the month of May dates back a long time. However, it wasn't until the 18th century when this practice became popular, especially among the members of the Jesuit Order in Rome. From there it spread to the rest of the Church. In 1945, Pope Pius XII solidified May as a Marian month after establishing the feast of the Queenship of Mary on May 31st. After the Second Vatican Council, this feast was moved to August 22, while May 31st became the feast of the Visitation of Mary.

The month of May is one rich in tradition and a beautiful time of the year to honour our heavenly mother.


INTERNATIONAL NURSES DAY-IND is celebrated around the world every May 12, the

THE CORONATION : SATURDAY 6 MAY : The television and the papers will focus on the pageantry and pomp, and will discuss the peripheral bits—the golden spurs, etc, but there is much litugical significance embedded in the



Anglican rite will be used , but it is astounding how many elements parallel the rite for espiscopal ordination in the Catholic tradition. The royal coronation will be during the celebration of the Eucharist. The Archbishop of Canterbury will preside . Included will be the singing of the Veni Creator(Come Holy

Spirit), the Litany of the Saints, and the Te Deum (solemn hymn of thanksgiving). He will be anointed with the Sacred Chrism accompanied by prayers of consecration. He will be anointed with a holy oil that has been blessed in Jerusalem and poured from the ampulla into a spoon that dates back to the 12th century. Welby performs the anointing by marking the symbol of the cross on Charles' head, breast and hands. It is based on Old Testament tradition when, apparently, Zadok the priest and Nathan the prophet anointed Solomon the king. The liturgy for the coronation has five elements: The recognition, the oath, the anointing, the investiture and crowning, and the enthronement and homage.

Priority 4 - RESPONDING TO ABUSE AND THE ABUSED

"In responding to abuse and the abused, we need to move beyond considerations of law and finance... Of course we need to attend to legal and financial matters, but the paramount concern needs to be the

good of those abused. Not all victims and survivors look to the Church for spiritual and pastoral accompaniment and care, but some do and others may in time, if ever trust can be established. We can learn from experience elsewhere in seeking to respond more effectively to abuse and the abused. Unless we do, this will remain a gaping wound – certainly for victims and survivors but for the whole Church as well – which makes it hard for us to move in the future."

HOW TO VOTE ON THE VOICE TO PARLIAMENT: Fr Frank Brennan SJ has written a short article with suggestions to




consider on deciding how to vote on the Voice to Parliament. Hardcopies are available in the churches. You can have it emailed to you by contacting the office.

"I suggest ten steps (**these are 8-10**) for Catholics inspired by our Catholic social teaching when approaching the forthcoming referendum. I couch these suggestions in terms appropriate for those of us who are not Indigenous. We are all invited into constructive dialogue. We must strive to listen to community leaders who know what is good for their communities just as those of us who are not Indigenous know what is good for ourselves and our loved ones.

8. Having decided which Aboriginal aspirations are justified, you then need to make a wise decision about which of those aspirations are politically achievable. Don't be afraid to talk to people with varying views when making that decision.
9. Having decided which Aboriginal aspirations are not only justified but achievable, you then need to decide to act. You need to put some skin in the game. You need to decide what concrete and just actions you will take. It's not enough just to vote when the referendum comes around. You need to get on board urging the parliament to put the right proposition to the vote, and helping your fellow citizens make an informed choice.

10. Be respectful and attentive to those who disagree with you, but don't be afraid to demand that they be respectful and attentive to you. Any national Voice worth its salt will have an elaborate system of local and regional ears to hear the local and regional voices which are needed to give credibility to any national Voice. That will be complex. There will be plenty of room for disagreement.

Through the story of his own journey and hearing the stories of others, Thomas taps into a deep sense of our shared humanity and makes clear what the Uluru Statement is and why it is so important.


