The gospel reading this week is brief and the message couldn't be clearer - the two most important commandments are to love God and love our neighbours as ourselves. Linking the two implies that it's through love of others that we demonstrate our acceptance of the gospel. In the other readings we hear that this love can be expressed by imitating the ways of the disciples and showing kindness and compassion to strangers, widows, orphans and the poor.

There are many ways we can show love for our neighbours. On Friday night, the Jubilee Parish community came together for a fundraiser for St Vincent de Paul, an organisation dedicated to providing care and support for those in need and a good example of our faith in action. Other examples exist throughout the parish, including those who take communion to people in hospital or confined to their homes or the warmth shown by individual communities at morning teas and events. These actions demonstrate a love of God by making the path easier for others. It's all a journey and some of us stumble many times along the way, but, as Paul reminded the Thessalonians in today's reading "It was with the joy of the Holy Spirit

THE LITURGIES OF NOVEMBER

November is traditionally associated in the Catholic Church with remembrance of the dead. True remembrance is not just about looking back to the past but also looking ahead to the future in trust and hope. Just as our loved ones shared in Christ's death in baptism, we believe that they will share in Christ's resurrection and enjoy eternal life in God's presence.

The feast of All Saints recognises all the saints of heaven, both known and unknown, in a single celebration. The feast of All Saints first appeared in the fourth century when Eastern Church introduced a feast to celebrate martyrs on the Sunday after Pentecost. By the seventh century, the feast was being observed in the West and included those saints who were not martyrs. The present date of 1st November follows a tradition established in England and Ireland.

November 2nd, the day after All Saints, is All Souls Day when we remember those who have not yet achieved the goal of the Kingdom of Heaven. The Church has always encouraged prayers for the faithful departed. Every celebration of Mass includes prayers for the dead. On All Souls we pray in unity for our deceased relatives and friends and for those who have no one to pray for them.

LITURGY MEETING Saturday 4 November Parish office 10.00am PRAY FOR PEACE. Pope Francis yesterday renewed his appeal to Hamas to release Israeli hostages and to Israel to let humanitarian aid reach Gaza, while inviting the faithful to join him in continuing to pray for peace.

The Pope said he continues to pray "for those who suffer and to hope for paths of peace, in the Middle East, in the tormented Ukraine and in other regions wounded by war."



NEWLY APPOINTED: FORMER Brisbane-based priest Fr Gerald Musa has been appointed by Pope Francis as the bishop of the newly-created Katsina diocese in northern Nigeria.



Fr Musa, 52, served as resident priest at St Bernard's, Upper Mount Gravatt, from 2008-2011; resident priest at the Jubilee Parish, and assistant chaplain at the Mater Hospital from 2011-2012; and parish administrator of Upper Mount Gravatt-Wishart Parish, in 2012-2013.

FOUNDED ON MERCY WHERE THE WATTLES WERE: Parishioner, Susanne Hodge has just published a book about the history and stories of the Sacred Heart School Rosalie from 1906-1995. There are many photos of



classes and school events shown in the book for remembrance and celebration. SYNOD ON SYNODALITY: October 16 reflections led by Australian theologian Fr Ormond Rush, from Townsville Diocese, professor at Australian Catholic University Brisbane.

"Having listened to you over these past three weeks, I have had the impression that some of you are struggling with the notion of tradition, in the light of your love of truth." Fr Rush said.

Tradition "was a major point of discussion at the Second Vatican Council," he added. "Their answers are, for us, the authority for guiding our reflections on the issues that confront us today."

Fr Rush addressed the Synod members and Pope Francis vesterday before they began to review a draft of a document summarising their conversations over the past three weeks.

Fr Rush spoke about a tension during the Second Vatican Council related to two approaches to tradition. Pope Benedict XVI, then Fr Joseph Ratzinger, was a theological consultant at Vatican II. He wrote about "a 'static' understanding of tradition and a 'dynamic' understanding," Fr Rush said.


"The former is legalistic, propositional, and ahistorical (i.e., relevant for all times and places): the latter is personalist, sacramental, and rooted in history, and therefore to be interpreted with a historical consciousness. The former tends to focus on the past,

the latter on seeing the past being realised in the present, and yet open to a future yet to be revealed." Synod update 26 October: The two-and-a-half-page letter addressed to the "People of God" recounted the spirit and activities of the Synod assembly's first session, held at the Vatican from October 4-29. It also looked ahead to the second session, expressing hope that the months leading up to October 2024 "will allow everyone to concretely

participate in the dynamism of missionary communion indicated by the word 'svnod'."

"This is not about ideology, but about an experience rooted in the apostolic tradition," the Synod assembly wrote. While the letter does not raise specific topics or questions to be addressed in the assembly's next session - a synthesis report reflecting the work of the first session and next steps is expected to be published on Saturday - it did say that to "progress in its discernment, the Church absolutely needs to listen to everyone, starting with the poorest".

"It means listening to those who have been denied the right to speak in society or who feel excluded, even by the Church,"
