Who are my family?

To better understand today's Gospel, it will be helpful to look back at when we were last in Ordinary Time in late January/early February. In those earlier chapters of Mark's Gospel, Jesus begins his mission with a bang – gathering disciples, casting out demons and healing the sick in great numbers, without checking their credentials or Medicare cards. This is what excited the crowds and upset the authorities.

In his mission, Jesus is guided by the Holy Spirit to do God's work for the benefit of all, even society's outcasts. His family is worried about all the fuss; the authorities accuse him of being possessed by demons, which Jesus rebuts by asking how can (and why would) an evil person cure the evil in another. God's response to the evil serpent in the first reading is to label it the most cursed of beasts, fit only to crawl, eat dust and have its head smashed in – that's a tough cure.

In the middle of this relatively straightforward narrative, Jesus talks about sin and forgiveness. He says all sins can be forgiven, except the sin of blasphemy against the Holy Spirit. By criticising this work, the scribes are rejecting the Holy Spirit, which Jesus says is unforgiveable.

On the other hand, Jesus welcomes those who do the will of God, as part of his family – 'that person is my brother and sister and mother'. Like Adam and Eve, we can choose whose family we belong to by following or rejecting the guidance of the Holy Spirit within us. The earthly path may sometimes be hard, as St Paul says in the second reading, but only for a short time, compared to the glory of the eternal spiritual life. **Jennifer Cahill**

ORDINARY? TIME: After the feast of Pentecost, the Church's liturgical calendar changed from the Season of Easter to Ordinary Time. The name "Ordinary Time" for that part of the Church year outside the seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter is rather an unfortunate term. The word "ordinary" usually means something that is unexceptional or uninteresting. However, the word "ordinary" as used in "Ordinary Time" means that the Sundays after the seasons of Christmas and Easter are counted in order, using *ordinal* numbers. There is no such thing as "ordinary time" in Christian worship. Gathering as the body of Christ to offer praise and worship to God is always something extra-ordinary!

The green of Ordinary Time points to our Christian hope and life as we celebrate the presence of God in the normal, day-to-day patterns of human life. During this time of the Church's year, we devote ourselves to exploring Christian discipleship in all its aspects and entering into the mystery of Christ in its fullness.

FUNERAL FOR FR JIM SMITH: A Funeral Mass will be celebrated on **Monday, 10 June, 2024 at 10.30am** at **St Mary's Church, 1B Elizabeth Street, Woodend**. Prior to the Mass, Rosary will commence at 10.00am and light refreshments will be served following the Mass. The funeral will proceed to the St Michael's Roman Catholic Cemetery, 856 Pine Mountain Road, Pine Mountain for the Rite of Christian Burial at 2.00pm.

GREEK AND LATIN ROOTS: In the words we use in worship there are traces of both our Greek and Latin heritage. The word 'Eucharist', for example, is Greek in origin. Christianity grew up in a Hellenistic culture. The first writings of the Christian Church, including the Gospel accounts, naturally used the language of the time and place where Christianity developed, and that was Greek. Even in Rome, the language of literature and culture was Greek.

'Eucharist' is the Greek word for 'thanksgiving'. At Mass we offer praise and thanks to God for the free gift of salvation we have been given through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus.

The word 'Mass', on the other hand, is Latin in origin. When Christianity came to Rome, most of the common people spoke only Latin so Pope Saint Callistus (217-222) decided that Latin should be used in liturgy. This move met with strong opposition from those who considered Latin too vulgar for worship, and the Roman liturgy was not completely Latinised until the late 4th century.

The term 'Mass' derives from the words used in the dismissal rite in Latin, '*Ite, missa est*'. Missa comes from *missio*, meaning 'to send', so the phrase was a sending out of the people. People understood that *Ite, missa est* meant 'the Mass is ended' and began to use the word 'missa' - which gradually became 'mass' - to refer to the whole of the celebration.

He is a devoted husband & father and many have known his kindness. Vinotha & David have Australian residency and depend on Nobert to care for them. Nobert is now applying for a Partner Visa which costs \$8850.00 in order to stay in the country to care for his family. Nobert has endured many obstacles in his quest to remain in Australia over the past 10 years living with the constant threat of deportation. His visas have ranged from 2 weeks to 3 months so the family are continually living on the edge not knowing what the future holds.

We are appealing to anyone who can donate towards the cost of the application for the Partner Visa. Our appeal is most urgent because Nobert cannot apply for the visa until he has the \$8850 to pay for it. **Del Hahne**

THE GREAT WALL OF ST JOAN OF ARC UPDATE

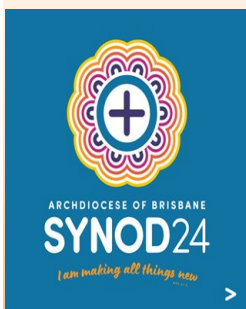
The new retaining wall and fence were substantially completed on Wednesday 5 June

In the last week we have welcomed a range of people into our school community. Last Sunday we celebrated a beautiful Family Mass with our friends in St Finbarr's Parish. Our staff, students and families thoroughly enjoy being part of the parish's Sunday celebrations - thank you for having us! After Mass, we welcomed some of our 2025 Prep students and their families into our school for a Prep Readiness session focused on early numeracy skills. Families left with a pack of fun numeracy games and activities to play with at home. On Wednesday we welcomed families from the local community to join us for St Finbarr's playgroup (which we host twice a term). It was such a joy to see families with similar aged children connect with each other and our staff. Céad Mile Fáilte - we are indeed a school of a hundred thousand welcomes!



Our Year 4 students recently had the exciting opportunity to provide feedback to teachers from various BCE schools on their proposed learning plans as part of Brisbane Catholic Educations Teacher Professional Development program.

We were incredibly proud of how the students represented St Joseph's and their enthusiasm was truly inspiring!

Eager to participate, the students shared their thoughts and ideas with a level of engagement that reminded us of how much they love to learn. The visiting teachers commented not only on our students' friendly dispositions but also on the depth of creativity and insight they demonstrated in their feedback.

Recognising the value of student input, our school is committed to creating more space for listening to student feedback. By incorporating their perspectives, we aim to enhance our programs and ensure that learning experiences are as enriching and effective as possible.



Last week, Mrs. Hurley had the privilege of visiting Prep, Year 1, and Year 2 during their Religious Education (RE) lesson time. In the Prep class, students listened to a Bible story from the book of Genesis. This particular story is the second creation account, which describes God creating man and woman. The story emphasizes their responsibility as stewards of creation. Additionally, it introduces the concept of "free choice," emphasizing that we must strive to make the best choices for ourselves, others, and our world. As the Preppies explore different images of God and discuss their understanding of the divine, they also learn from the song "God is Everywhere" by Drew Lane. This uplifting tune reminds them that God is present in everyone who loves us, in ourselves, and in the wonders of our world. Year One students have been delving into the sacrament of Baptism. They listened to the story of Jesus' baptism and are now exploring the symbols, words, and actions associated with this sacred rite.
