## 14<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time



God knows our inner most hearts and our needs and stands ready to help **always**. Great news - we hear in St Paul's letter to the Romans that the Spirit of God lives in each of us. St Paul also tells us that we are a temple of the Holy Spirit. This is worth paying attention to. God's spirit blesses us, frees us and walks with us when we remember it and when we don't. God gives us His life; eternal life which has already started!!

As Fr Richard Rohr OFM says, it may be easier to see God in the big moments of life; like in the Resurrection and even just see 'God out there' and in creation. It can be harder to remember *God-within us*. This is God who dwells in our inner most hearts. It's almost as if we see ourselves as not worthy and even minimize the possibility that God would want to live in us. I reckon prayer, talking to God within, is going to be different and more personal because we come to know this more and more!

So knowing God lives in you - I am going to ask;

- can you believe that God's spirit knows your heart and your mind and your needs always, even when you feel unable to express things, let alone pray, that the Spirit prays for you and in you always - **that's reassuring news**

If we are honest, all of us have times when prayer is not easy or we forget to pray; just talk to God about what's going on. And remembering Romans, God in our hearts knows anyway and is present even in the puzzling, difficult, silent even lonely times or when much seems lost. Again, God is always ready to hear and act. And that's going to make all the difference.

By way of example, this week two people who had been homeless and who are now getting housing and necessary care came to catch up about how things really were. Society may have forgotten about them, for a time, but God hadn't. And we prayed together.

God's love is and was present when they remembered it and when they didn't. Us too. It's like that for all of us if we are honest. God present, knowing and acting where they and we have been and where they/we are going....


Why not ask God for what you need this week and remember God's Spirit is closer than your very breath; when we remember it and when we don't.

Blessed Peter To Rot

**Blessed Peter To Rot, martyr.** Feast day 7 July. Blessed Peter To Rot was born in 1912 in a town named *Rakunai* on the island of New Britain in Papua New Guinea. The town had for some time been visited by missionaries. His parents were amongst the first adults to be baptised and first Catholics in the country.

At a young age, Peter was very interested in his faith. For this reason, he was trained to be a catechist in a Mission School and taught religion to the people of *Rakunai*. In 1936, he married a Catholic woman Paula la Varpit from a nearby village.

World War II altered the lives of the people of Papua New Guinea. The Japanese invaded the country and all missionaries were imprisoned. As a result, Peter was left as the only spiritual

leader in the area. He kept providing prayer services and helped the poor. When people were afraid of the Japanese, he prompted them that God was with them.

In 1942, the Japanese prohibited any form of religious gatherings and worship even those in homes. This movement was intended to push back the people to pre-Christian forms of life, including having several wives. Peter strongly opposed the idea of polygamy and kept his catechetical work secretly in caves. He was seen as a treat to the Japanese because the people supported him. He was put in prison in 1945 for several months. His wife and mother visited him in prison, and he told them that he would die for the Church. Peter died when a group of men gave him a drink and an injection while his mouth was covered. His funeral was held in silence because the people feared the Japanese. In 1995, Pope John Paul II beatified Peter To Rot when he visited Papua New Guinea. Blessed Peter To Rot, pray for us! *Louie*



### Sacramental Initiation for Year 3 and 4 this year and next:

**For those in Year 4 upwards who are already preparing for First Holy Communion:** continue preparation with your family at home, and when possible join in weekend mass.



When your passport is complete contact Jenny Donnelly and a date can be organized for your child to receive First Holy Communion at a weekend mass. Dates for larger celebrations will be provided when they can be celebrated in accordance with government protocols.

### Preparation for Confirmation for those presently in year 3:

Because of limits at weekend masses, AND uncertainty of unrestricted gatherings I am postponing preparation and celebration of Confirmation until early 2021.

There would be two groups: one for those in year 4 early in the year and one later in the year for those in year 3 in 2021. Those in year 4 in 2021 would be able to begin preparation for first holy communion immediately after Confirmation in 2021. Those in year 3 in 2021 would prepare for first holy communion in late 2021 or 2022.

## Catholic religious institutes sign on to scheme

All 57 Catholic religious institutes named in the child abuse royal commission data survey have either been declared or have committed in writing to join the National Redress Scheme. In addition, numerous religious institutes not named by the Royal Commission into Institutional Child Sexual Abuse have also joined or are committed to joining the NRS.

“The commitment of Catholic Religious Australia members to work compassionately with survivors of child sexual abuse has been ongoing for 20 years and continues to be demonstrated by religious institutes joining the National Redress Scheme,” said Br Peter Carroll FMS, president of Catholic Religious Australia.

CRA has taken a leadership role in providing advice and support to religious institutes to assist them in joining the redress scheme. “Catholic religious institutes believe in the NRS; we want the NRS to work effectively, we want it to be successful for survivors. The NRS is a valuable pathway for survivors and one that provides a simpler, less traumatic alternative to civil litigation,” Br Peter said.

## Vinnies welcomes extension of drought payment

The St Vincent de Paul Society has welcomed the Commonwealth Government’s decision to extend its Drought Community Support Initiative to the end of the year.

National Council chief executive Toby O’Connor said Vinnies were helping administer the funding for farmers, farm workers and farm suppliers in eligible, drought-declared local government areas. “The society is committed to ensuring as many eligible households as possible receive this important payment.”

“We have already assisted over 9,000 households, yet we know from our local contacts there are still many potential recipients who we haven’t reached and we want to ensure they have a chance to access the support under this extended round. A \$3,000 payment can provide significant help with household expenses and day to day items,” Mr O’Connor said.
