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Again this week our Gospel comes from Mark. (Mark is a prominent focus in our Year B Reading Cycle).

Generally with Mark's Gospels we are taken on a journey about the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. The focus is usually about the ministry of Jesus. However in today's gospel Jesus and his disciples are visiting various villages. Often we hear about miracles but Jesus starts to question his disciples about his identity. In particular, Jesus questions Peter. It leads to what seems as heated or angry confrontation between Jesus and Peter. Peter is irate at the attitude of Jesus and rebukes Jesus. It's like a slanging match. In the end Jesus calls Peter "Satan".

It seems that after a campaign of preaching, healing and casting out demons, Jesus is suddenly questioning the disciples about his real identity. I feel he is saying... you have seen me do remarkable work (healing, preaching, casting out demons), but have you not got the message yet.

I am sure that we have all had people like the disciples in our lives at some time. It doesn't matter how much we offer guidance, help in some way or be a listening ear, some people don't acknowledge or listen to advice. Like the disciples we may have angered someone and been rebuked. How difficult is it to maintain our faith in them?

There is a change of focus in this passage, from the questioning of his identity, to Jesus stating his role as the Messiah as one of suffering and death (Mark 8:31). What is Jesus doing here? Is he telling his disciples about what might happen to him, is he predicting his death? He is guiding us (and his disciples) to what will be happening next....leading to Jesus's resurrection.

But as James tells us in the second reading, today faith without actions is useless. We are called through confirmation to express our faith through our actions and ideally how we live our lives. We should take a lesson from Peter and James. Peter had no problem acknowledging the identity of Jesus, he called him the Messiah. And as James tells us we should show our faith with our actions in everyday life, not just on a Sunday. As Catholics lets us endeavour, to continue, to live out this message in everyday life. *Kathleen McClafferty*

#### SEASON OF CREATION — HOPE AND ACT WITH CREATION



Pope Francis reminds us that "Hoping and acting with creation means first of all joining forces and walking together with all men and women of good will." In this moment of struggle for our common home, we are united. We join together with our sisters and brothers throughout the world in common purpose. But hope is not the end of the story. We are also called to action.

Pope Francis tells us that the Holy Spirit "keeps the believing community alert and continually instructs them, calls them to conversion in lifestyles, to resist human degradation of the environment."

SYNOD 2024: The September meeting of SYNOD 24 shows the Church in



Brisbane wants to act on the outcomes of the fifth Plenary Council of Australia. The two-day session brought about 140 voices of Brisbane archdiocese together at Holy Spirit Seminary, Banyo, over Friday and Saturday, September 6 and 7. Every action examined at the synod cleared the two-thirds majority required for endorsement, with one action re-written with broader language

before it was ultimately endorsed. The actions spanned topics like mission in the digital environment, how the power of governance should be supported by the laity, dialoguing with survivors of sexual abuse and reconciliation. "I can only put my own hand up and say I didn't know what to expect going into this," Fr Josh Whitehead said. "But it was edifying to experience the voting process and perhaps even more than that, the conversations in the Spirit, listening deeply to people at the table, cultivating a sense of belonging and identity in the group."

Synod member Sr Theresa Maria Dao said she saw a lot of dreams being planted in the archdiocese, but that she had also grappled with many challenges in the conversations. She had a lot of hope for the synod overall and saw a Christ-centred vision at the heart of the Church in Brisbane. The synod would reconvene in October for another two-day session to examine other decrees of the Plenary Council.




WORLD WEEK FOR PEACE IN PALESTINE AND ISRAEL: The theme for the World

#### FEAST OF SAINTS KIM TAE-GON AND PAUL CHONG HA-SANG AND COMPANIONS



20 September The <u>evangelization</u> of Korea began during the 17th century through a group of lay persons.

A vital strong Christian community flourished there under lay leadership until missionaries arrived from the Paris Foreign Mission Society. During the terrible persecutions that occurred in the 19th century (in 1839, 1866, and 1867), 103 members of

the Christian community gave their lives as martyrs. Outstanding among these witnesses to the faith were the first Korean priest and pastor, Andrew Kim Taegon, and the lay apostle, Paul Chong Hasang. Remembered for their fearless witness in the face of torture and death. Jubilee Parish prays for their intercession on this feast day for our Korean Community. May God continue to inspire their faithful discipleship.

culminates with World Day for Migrants and Refugees that Sunday the 29th. In his latest message for the World Day of Migrants and Refugees, Pope Francis emphasizes the theme "<u>God Walks with His People.</u>" This theme serves as a reminder that God consistently accompanies His people throughout history, guiding and providing for them, much like He did for the Israelites. Pope Francis draws a parallel between the experiences of migrants today and the ancient Israelites' journey from slavery to freedom, highlighting the similar

challenges of oppression and hardship they face. As Catholics, we are commanded by Jesus (MT 25) to provide support and care for the most vulnerable among us, including the naked, the hungry, the imprisoned, and the stranger. Through this outreach, we are called to accompany migrants at all stages of their journey: from the point of origin, through transit, and to their final destination.




# SACRAMENT OF FIRST HOLY COMMUNION:

**LIFT UP YOUR VOICE:** Music is an important part of special gatherings – singing "Happy Birthday to you", carols at Christmas, etc – and singing is integral to liturgy because it too is a celebration – a celebration of faith. The hymns that we sing enable us to express our faith in a way that otherwise we might find difficult to do and words often take on a much deeper meaning when sung. Singing also offers a unique means for us to express joy and enthusiasm.

Singing is a way that everyone can fully participate in the liturgy as we are expected to do. We sing because we are people of prayer and, according to an ancient proverb, those who sing pray twice.

This personal story about people singing at Mass has an important message for us all. "A few months ago I was feeling devastated after the death of my husband. I would go to Mass but found myself unable to join in singing the hymns or responses. But my spirits were lifted by the singing of those around me. It felt as if my fellow parishioners were singing for me when I couldn't. When my voice was silenced by grief, the community of the faithful carried me. Over time, they gave me back my voice and I was able to sing with them again."
