




In the course of the Gospel, it is often when Jesus has something important to communicate, that He tells a parable. In this way, Jesus leads those who listen to discover the call of God. The parable of Lazarus and the rich man beautifully gives us a glimpse of what it means to attain fullness of life and is, at the same time, a call for conversion.

The parable is about a rich man ignoring the needs of a poor man, and then seeing how their fortunes are reversed in the afterlife. The rich man speaks of warnings, and regrets that he didn't get a clear message about the consequences of his actions. If someone had returned from the dead to warn him, maybe he would have made better choices. But Jesus is clear – if the rich man didn't listen to Moses, to

whom would he listen?

While the parable condemns those who ignore the needs of the poor, it also tells a tragic story of the rich man, who does not seem to have any remorse for his life, just a vague regret that he wasn't sent enough warnings to repent. The prideful rich man is so deeply mired in his sin that even at that moment, he takes no responsibility, shows no love for God or Lazarus, whom he still feels is beneath him as a servant, to bring him water in his despair. And the price he pays for his non-repentance is the flaming torment he has to endure. We can take away much from this powerful parable. It certainly calls us to soften our hearts to the poor around us. Is there a Lazarus in our lives? Are there people who need our help but whom we simply ignore? Perhaps they are right in our very home or in our neighbourhood? Through the parable, Jesus challenges us that instead of filling our lives with ourselves, we need to make room for love and mercy, room for God and our neighbours. It is because only in God that our life, our true satisfaction and happiness can be found. **Fr Dang**

## Message of Pope Francis for the World Day of Migrants and Refugees

**25 September 2022 - extract**

Dear brothers and sisters!

God's plan is inclusive and gives priority to those living on the peripheries. Among them are many migrants and refugees, displaced persons, and victims of trafficking. History teaches us that the contribution of migrants and refugees has been fundamental to the social and economic growth of our societies. This continues to be true in our own day. Enormous potential exists, ready to be harnessed, if only it is given a chance.

The presence of migrants and refugees represents a great challenge, but at the same time an immense opportunity for the cultural and spiritual growth of everyone. Thanks to them, we have the chance to know better our world and its beautiful diversity. Openness to one another leads to a discovery of the richness present in other religions and forms of spirituality unfamiliar to us, and this helps us to deepen our own convictions.

Sharing different expressions of faith and devotions offers us a privileged opportunity for experiencing more fully the catholicity of the People of God. Dear brothers and sisters, let us build the future today so that God's plan for the world may be realized and his Kingdom of justice, fraternity, and peace may come.

## Albanese visits Thursday Island to begin consultation on Voice

Anthony Albanese has travelled to the Torres Strait along with Indigenous Australians Minister Linda Burney and Queensland senator Nita Green, for discussions on what an Indigenous voice might look like.

An Indigenous Voice to Parliament is an outstretched hand of friendship from First Nations people to the rest of Australia, Prime Minister Anthony Albanese says.

In a meeting with the Torres Strait Regional Authority during a visit to Thursday Island, Mr Albanese also reaffirmed his support for his government choosing to display all three national flags during press conferences.

"We have flags that represent our entire nation. It's an opportunity to speak about our full history."


Mr Albanese vowed his trip would not be his last to the region as prime minister, and told community leaders he wanted to leave "permanent footprints" and see real change.

"That is why it is so important that Australians are given the opportunity to join that hand outstretched which is there in friendship," he said. "The Uluru statement is a very generous hand out from people where the gap is there.

"I see this as something that won't just benefit Indigenous Australians, it will benefit all Australians."

"The voice ... is a very modest request in my view," he said. "As a step towards how we improve the engagement that needs to occur to fully reconcile our nation." Ms Burney met with state and territory Indigenous ministers on Wednesday to discuss the implementation of the Voice to Parliament and the Uluru Statement from the Heart.

"All governments emphasised their strong ongoing commitment to working together to improve practical outcomes for First Nations peoples," a statement read. Ministers are set to meet again at the end of the month at the joint council for closing the gap, where progress on the national agreement will be on the agenda. *Published 18.8.22 SBS NEWS*

## Children's Gospel Reflection and activities

- In the Gospel today, we hear about a rich man who wanted to go back and warn his brothers what would happen to them if they didn't change their ways. But like the dragonflies in the story he and Lazarus couldn't go back.
- But unlike the dragonflies, we already know a bit about what awaits us. We have been told about the great things God has in store for those who love.
- We can read about it in the bible; read the messages from the old prophets, the stories of Jesus' life and from the letters from the disciples to the new believers.
- We can learn about it from the lives of the saints who have gone before us, and we can ask others about what they know about what God has in store for those who love him.

- What do you already know about God?
- Who are others you could ask to learn more?
- How do you think God wants you to live your life?



### Dragonflies

#### Background

A colourful craft to help children remember the dragonfly story.

#### You will need:

- Pipe cleaners
- Beads
- marker pen

#### Instructions:

1. Give each child 3 pipe cleaners and fold them into the shape of the body with a head and two wings as shown in the picture.



2. Feed a couple of beads onto the body and attach wings to the body by twisting them on. Then continue adding beads along the body.
