

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Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time – 7 / 8 July 2018

Australian culture delights in the 'tall poppy syndrome', of cutting people down to size. In today's gospel, when Jesus is invited to teach in his home town synagogue, he fails to meet their expectations. We are not told his actual words, but they are the words of one who has exorcised, healed, raised from the dead, and proclaimed the Good News. In some way the listeners consider that Jesus' words go against their own comfortable interpretation of family custom or established religion. Here is the Nazareth version of the 'tall poppy'. Nazareth think they know everything about Jesus and his family. Jesus has to be cut down to hometown size as the local carpenter. Jesus embodies the 'scandal' of the ordinary. Familiarity breeds contempt in the hometown whose perceptions are limited to the domestic and parochial. They are closed to any surprising presence and action of God that would challenge their own perception. They consider their own wisdom superior to that of Jesus. They ask the right questions, but their prejudice supplies them with the wrong answers. Amazement deteriorates into offense and rejection. It sorrows Jesus. He in turn is amazed at their lack of faith that leads to his powerlessness. For Jesus' deeds of power to be effective they need to be worked with the cooperative faith of those gathered. May our faith open us to the possibilities God provides.

NAIDOC Week July 8-15: "Because of her we can." This year's theme celebrates the essential role that women have played - and continue to play - as active and significant role models at the community, local, state and national levels. In their annual message, the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference praised the role of women, especially mothers and grandmothers, in the life of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities. It also speaks of the role model of the Virgin Mary in the life of the Catholic Church.

Aboriginal Thanksgiving Prayer: God of Holy Dreaming, Great Creator Spirit, from the dawn of creation you have given your children the good things of Mother Earth. You spoke and the gum tree grew. In the vast desert and the dense forest, and in the cities and at the water's edge creation sings your praise. Your presence endures at the rock at

Lead us on, Great Spirit, as we gather from the four corners of the earth; enable us to walk together in trust from the hurt and shame of the past into the full day which has dawned in Jesus Christ. Proclaim Conference Brisbane July 12 -14:



It is finally here! For the first time, the Brisbane Archdiocese will host the national Proclaim Conference. PROCLAIM 2018 focuses on inspiring, equipping and encouraging parishes to engage in Evangelisation and Renewal. The theme is "Make your home in me" (Jn 15:4)

PROCLAIM 2018 will run across three days from 12-14 July, 2018 at The Edmund Rice Performing Arts Centre (St Laurence's College, South Brisbane). "Proclaim 2018 will inspire Catholics to explore new ways of contemplating the face of Christ in community and so empower them to set out on the new paths of mission which the Holy Spirit is tracing for us at this crucial time" - Brisbane Archbishop Mark Coleridge. Conference speakers include Cardinal John Dew (Archdiocese of Wellington, New Zealand), Ron Huntley (Divine Renovation – Canada), Ms Lana Turvey-Collins (Plenary Council 2020 Facilitator), Karolina Gunsser (Community Leader - Citipointe Church), Mons Enrique Fiquaredo SJ (Cambodia) and host of PROCLAIM 2018 Archbishop Mark Coleridge (Archdiocese of Brisbane).

Deacon Brendan Gormley: Brendan is a Brisbane man who, in discerning God's call, was invited by Archbishop Coleridge to study for the priesthood at the Beda College in Rome. During these years he would come home for his summer break and be involved pastorally in various parishes around the Archdiocese. Last year he was ordained Deacon. Now, he has finished his study in Rome and the Archbishop has appointed him to Jubilee Parish. He will begin here next weekend and will continue his pastoral formation as he looks towards ordination to the priesthood sometime in the future. He will be living with Fr Marty and I at the presbytery and we look forward to welcoming him into the community.

Enrolment for Confirmation is now available: If your child is in Year 3 or upwards at the present time they are eligible for enrolment in the formation process that is about to begin. Enrolment Forms are available on the parish website www.jubileeparish.com. There is a compulsory Parent Information night at Sacred Heart Church Rosalie on Thursday night 19 July at 7pm that will explain all the practicalities. Please share with parents and advise them they need to be prepared.

Enrolment for First Holy Communion for children in Year 4 and upwards: If your child has ALREADY CELEBRATED THE SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION, and has **not yet** received First Holy Communion, you can also go onto the parish website www.jubileeparish.com and use the same enrolment form for your child for First Holy Communion. You will be asked to provide a copy of your child's Confirmation certificate. Explanation of the formation process will be provided at the compulsory Parent Information night at Sacred Heart Church Rosalie on Thursday night 19 July at 7pm. Practicalities will be explained on this evening.



Surprise guest at dinner for Rome's homeless

Some 280 poor people were invited to a dinner at the Vatican by new Cardinal Konrad Krajewski, the official almsgiver of the Pope, who was made cardinal by Pope Francis at the Consistory the previous day. Pope Francis surprised Cardinal Krajewski, his guests and volunteers with a visit and joined them at table at the Vatican employees' canteen. "I came for the poor, not for you," a smiling Pope told Cardinal Krajewski, popularly known as Fr Corrado (instead of Konrad) to the poor he serves on behalf of the Pope. Francis dined with the poor and spent about two hours chatting with them as if in a family, listening to their stories that often told of suffering but also of hope. There were about 60 volunteers serving dinner to the poor, including Carlo Santoro of the Community of Sant'Egidio of Rome, who collaborates with Cardinal Krajewski's Office of Papal Charities, to assist the homeless in Rome. "It was an especially warm visit because it was a dinner of the new cardinal with the poor," Mr Santoro said. "To the surprise of all, the Holy Father arrived. We thought it was a simple greeting and he would be off soon," he said. The new cardinal turned to Mr Santoro asking him to make room close to him for the Pope. Mr Santoro said the Pope greeted everyone with great affection. At the Pope's table were several Syrian refugees who had arrived through the efforts of the Sant'Egidio Community. One of them travelled to Rome with the Pope after his visit to the Greek island of Lesbos in 2016. The man told the Pope he is now working and is integrated in Italy.

The Lord Calls – (excerpt from the Apostolic Exhortation *Gaudete Et Exsultate*)

10. All this is important. Yet with this Exhortation I would like to insist primarily on the call to holiness that the Lord addresses to each of us, the call that he also addresses, personally, to you: "Be holy, for I am holy" (*Lev 11:44*; cf. *1 Pet 1:16*). The Second Vatican Council stated this clearly: "Strengthened by so many and such great means of salvation, all the faithful, whatever their condition or state, are called by the Lord – each in his or her own way – to that perfect holiness by which the Father himself is perfect".

11. "Each in his or her own way" the Council says. We should not grow discouraged before examples of holiness that appear unattainable. There are some testimonies that may prove helpful and inspiring, but that we are not meant to copy, for that could even lead us astray from the one specific path that the Lord has in mind for us. The important thing is that each believer discern his or her own path, that they bring out the very best of themselves, the most personal gifts that God has placed in their hearts (cf. *1 Cor 12:7*), rather than hopelessly trying to imitate something not meant for them. We are all called to be witnesses, but there are many actual ways of bearing witness. Indeed, when the great mystic, Saint John of the Cross, wrote his *Spiritual Canticle*, he preferred to avoid hard and fast rules for all. He explained that his verses were composed so that everyone could benefit from them "in his or her own way". For God's life is communicated "to some in one way and to others in another".

12. Within these various forms, I would stress too that the "genius of woman" is seen in feminine styles of holiness, which are an essential means of reflecting God's holiness in this world. Indeed, in times when women tended to be most ignored or overlooked, the Holy Spirit raised up saints whose attractiveness produced new spiritual vigour and important reforms in the Church. We can mention Saint Hildegard of Bingen, Saint Bridget, Saint Catherine of Siena, Saint Teresa of Avila and Saint Thérèse of Lisieux. But I think too of all those unknown or forgotten women who, each in her own way, sustained and transformed families and communities by the power of their witness.

13. This should excite and encourage us to give our all and to embrace that unique plan that God willed for each of us from eternity: "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, and before you were born I consecrated you" (*Jer 1:5*).
